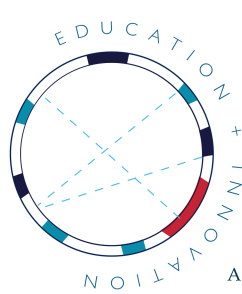

PANELISTS:

Engy Abdelkader is an award-winning attorney, scholar and Master of Laws (LL.M.) candidate at the University of Pennsylvania Law School where her areas of concentration include Islamic Legal Studies and Civil Rights and National Security Law. Ms. Abdelkader presently serves as Vice President of KARAMAH: Muslim Women Lawyers for Human Rights; she is also a Legal Fellow with the Institute for Social Policy and Understanding. She has written and spoken extensively about racial and ethnic justice, American Muslims, women and Islamic Law.

Sapana S. Shah is a trial attorney and active in both her profession and community. She heads her own law firm and is former president of the Asian Pacific American Lawyers Association of New Jersey. She also serves on the Edison Board of Education. Her community activities include work with immigrant families, mentoring law students, volunteering at local soup kitchens, conducting free seminars for local churches, and holding “law days” for local high school students.

Nusrat Sohail is an educator who has taught both in the US and Pakistan. She is currently creating and designing Urdu and Hindi language classes for heritage students in NY and NJ. Some of her work includes innovative use of social media and mobile applications as teaching tools. She also develops educational materials for governmental agencies. She serves on multiple boards and organizations, such as Mid Atlantic Regional Association of Asian Studies and Aligarh Muslim University Alumni Association.
